



1. Have a guess where your favourite Disney films are set in the world!

2. Use the Disney map to find out where the films are actually set (add this information to your table if you've done one). You can use atlases or iPads to help you match the countries from the map and work out their names, or you could research the film online. Try to give as much detail as you can about where it is!

3. Choose one Disney film and spend 10-15 minutes researching the country/city where it is set. Record what you find in a spider diagram. Try to find out:

- Climate/temperature
- Famous landmarks
- Traditional clothing
- Traditional food and drink
- Language
- Physical geography and natural features (e.g. rivers, mountains, volcanoes)
- Human geography (e.g. who lives there, what jobs do they do, what are the buildings like?)

4. Use your learning about the location to complete one of the following activities:

- 🐭 Design a new costume for one of the main characters. Make sure it is appropriate for the climate there, and include any traditional elements such as shape or design.
- 🐭 Make a storyboard for a sequel to the film, set in the same location. It may include a problem specific to that location (e.g. natural disasters, deforestation, wars, pollution). Make it as true to the location as possible, e.g. characters eating the right food, wearing the right clothing, etc.
- 🐭 Write a menu for a restaurant or café that one of the characters may visit.
- 🐭 Make a tourist leaflet for the location of your movie. Include key settings from the film in your leaflet. For example, for Finding Nemo: "Come to visit Sydney and you can see the REAL dentist surgery at 42 Wallaby Way!".
- 🐭 Write a newspaper report about one of the key events in the movie. For example, for Frozen: "ICE QUEEN BRINGS ETERNAL WINTER TO NORWAY!".
